STEVEN KLAPPHOLZ, NEW V.P., JEWISH HOME FOUNDATION

In early 2018, Steven Klappholz joined the Los Angeles Jewish Home as Vice President of the Jewish Home Foundation. In this role, Steven provides leadership in the Home's fundraising efforts, including the ongoing **Keeping the Vision:** *Expand, Extend, Sustain* campaign. He also supports board and leadership development and training.

Prior to his arrival at the Home, Steven served as director of the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum's Western Regional Office. In this position, he oversaw fundraising efforts and educational activities for major gifts, annual campaigns, endowment, restricted giving, and planned giving from across the region. Steven was also Vice President of Development at Survivors of the Shoah Visual History Foundation; after its merger with the University of Southern California, Executive Director of Development for the newly formed USC Shoah Foundation's Institute for Visual History and Education.

Steven's experience also includes collaborating with volunteer leadership to plan, organize, coordinate, and implement fundraising efforts for organizations like the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences Foundation, Cedars-Sinai Medical Center, and the United Jewish Federation of San Diego County.

Steven received his Bachelor of Science in political science/urban affairs at The American University in Washington, D.C., and a Master of Social Work from Yeshiva University in New York.






Keeping the Vision: Expand, Extend, Sustain is the Home's bold \$265 million campaign to provide quality senior care today and for future generations. The Jewish Home has always pursued an ambitious vision to meet the needs of our community's seniors. Currently, the U.S. Department of the Treasury projects L.A. County's senior population will double by 2030. Keeping the Vision enables us to continue growing our programs and services so we are equipped to provide these seniors with highquality care. To date, we have raised \$224 million; our current focus is on raising funds to renovate Grancell Village.

The Grancell Village campus transformation will add two fivestory buildings. The new buildings

The Polak Family Building will feature a lobby, community geriatric medical clinic, intergenerational center and playground, cyber internet café, outdoor dining and garden, and street-accessible parking.

The Harriet & Benjamin D. Bagno Towers will offer dining rooms, meeting rooms, the Performing Arts Center with the Goldstine Chapel, Enrichment Hub, and Scholar's Study. Innovative areas will include Creative Expressions Center, the Game Room, Fireplace Lounge, Bistro, and Wellness Center. The Ted Slavin Family Aquatics and Fitness Center with the Berman-Rutenberg Pool and Spa will







offer aquatic programs. The newly renovated Grancell Campus will be connected by beautiful landscaped gardens, a putting green, and outdoor areas with gardens for programs such as T'ai Chi. All this is planned for the Grancell Village transformation which will strengthen minds and foster creative and spiritual expression.



Amenities include a fitness center, a pool, casual and upscale dining services, the Ann and Simon Friedman Game Room, an art studio, activity center, and a state-of-the-art theater for movies and live performances.

We are tremendously grateful to the Shapiros for their thoughtfulness and loving support.


Donor Profile Danny Rosett and Tracy Kooy

Since 2011, the Jewish Home has been fortunate to count Danny Rosett and Tracy Kooy among its most dedicated supporters. Rosett's introduction to the Home came via Skirball Hospice, which was a critical resource for his father as he approached his end-of-life transition. "It was obviously a very sad time, but we were comforted knowing he received excellent care from a highly competent and compassionate organization," Rosett recalls. "It was only after the fact that I realized Skirball Hospice was just one of many services provided by the Jewish Home. I reached out to thank them for their support in our time of need, met [CEO-President] Molly Forrest, and was hooked." As they say, the rest is history!

Rosett and Kooy are passionate believers in the power of philanthropy to achieve positive impact. "We're an aging population, and fewer and fewer of us are going to have the financial resources or access to quality healthcare we are going to need," Rosett says. But through support of the Home, he continues, "we can help maintain its place at the forefront of innovation in providing state-of-theart senior care, as well as enabling it to expand its vital community-based services." The bottom line, Kooy points out, is that partnering with the Home will allow it to "continue to grow and flourish so it can serve as a crucial safety net for seniors well into the future."

In addition to her contributions to the Jewish Home, Kooy, a fifth grade teacher in Santa Monica, has a long track record of giving back to the community. As a board member of Teachers Across Borders, an international organization that empowers teachers through professional development, she made several trips to Southeast Asia, where she experienced first-hand the joy of helping at the grassroots level.

Rosett, a successful entertainment executive who formerly served as President of United Artists (MGM's specialty film division), is similarly moved to activism, which he attributes in part to his Jewish heritage. "Our tradition

"Doing that is a *mitzvah*, a commandment, and it also feels really wonderful."

Planned Giving Profile

Dr. Rosalyn Heyman: "A Poor Girl Rises and Creates Her Own Legacy"

Rosalyn Heyman spent her career in education, beginning as a school teacher in the Los Angeles Unified School District. She rose through the ranks and was appointed Principal of Berendo Junior High, which Roz describes as the "worst" school in the district in an impoverished neighborhood. "Two police officers patrolled the campus, but I walked alone," Roz says. After she took over Berendo, the school turned around. With Roz's innovations, Berendo reached new heights such as introducing the first school computer lab in the United States.

Roz says she spent her time driving to work each day thinking about how she was going to trick people into doing what she wanted. One of her ideas: Over summer break, she threw out the old lesson plans of stubborn teachers who refused to update them, and then blamed the custodians for their "carelessness." She also had lockers opened each morning and confiscated contraband. She figured students couldn't complain that someone had stolen their knife or gun!

Eventually Roz became Assistant Superintendent for Secondary Instruction of LAUSD – quite a rise for someone who grew up poor and without a father! Now Roz holds an honorary doctorate from Pepperdine University, supports the Jewish Home, and is a philanthropist. She moved into Fountainview in 2017. When she needed more

assistance, she moved into the Joyce Eisenberg-Keefer Medical Center for several months, where she received numerous visitors including teachers she hired more than 30 years ago!

Roz says the Jewish Home will be a big part of her legacy as it is one of her major beneficiaries. She believes in the importance of helping others, and she thinks the Home does an excellent job of caring for thousands of seniors each year.

Sidonia Lax, a Holocaust survivor, was born in Przemyls, Poland. In 1939 her hometown was turned into a ghetto. Her parents were eventually killed, and she was transported to Auschwitz in April 1944; two weeks later, she was transferred to Bergen-Belsen. Sidonia moved to four other labor camps before being liberated by the Russian army on May 5, 1945. She arrived in the United States in 1947.

Monise Neumann is a senior consultant for the Builders of Jewish Education (BJE) March of the Living programs for teens and adults. Her work in Jewish education over the past 30 years includes serving as director of BJE high school programs, Halutz, and Yad b'Yad, as well as staffing the BJE Summer Ulpan program in Israel and the March of the Living program.
